Re: A Summary of the Findings from the March 8th Polk/Rutherford Town Hall Meeting

# Background:

- Polk and Rutherford counties have an equine history and culture that dates back at least 65 years. From
  this foundation, local community leaders envision an equine-based economy that would fuel regional
  development and direct regional growth. Integral to this vision is the establishment of a local equine
  research and education center.
- The establishment of the privately owned <u>Tryon International Equestrian Center (TIEC)</u> increases the appeal of this vision.
- To further the vision, Isothermal Community College applied for and received a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission and invited North Carolina State University (NCSU) as a subcontractor to determine feasibility and physical development plans that will best accommodate the needs of the surrounding communities.
- Representatives from ICC, NCSU, and the local community met on March 8th to kickoff the community
  engagement component of the project with a mini-town hall meeting focused on each of the areas listed
  below. This session helped to gain a preliminary sense of different perspectives on this opportunity and
  determine the steps moving forward. A summary of responses based on five questions posed to the
  group are provided below:

# Group Question: <u>How can the equine-based economy fuel more equitable and sustainable prosperity in the area?</u>

- Capitalize on the rural character and key location of the area as a major economic *triangle* that extends from Charlotte to Asheville and into South Carolina.
- Capitalize on the popularity and economic impact of the 2018 World Equestrian Games.
- Provide an additional resource for animal science and the veterinary school at NC State.
- Promote Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) with high school students.
- Create a college bridge for students for students from ICC and other CCs
- Complement recently developed ICC equine program and courses
- Provide further support for the equine industry in the area.
- Be a driver of responsible local private and public economic development.
- The Equine Research & Education Center (EREC) would be developed to complement local equine industry.
- Support a year-round equine-based economy.
- Support efforts to minimize job and people emigration.
- Support and provide an example for other non-equine economic opportunities including tourism,



- hospitality, agriculture, textiles, construction, waste, etc.
- Provide collaborative opportunities for ICC and various colleges and departments within NCSU, including Outreach & Engagement, the vet school, the waste research center, Cooperative Extension, etc.
- Models of Equine Research and Education centers around the country should be examined to identify sustainable and revenue generating strategies. These could include the Clemson University International Center for Automotive Research, the Conditioning Center in Wellington, Florida, and research centers in Kannapolis, Arlington, and Cornell.
